The meeting began at 10:36 a.m.

### 1. Approval of minutes

Motion made and seconded to approve the minutes of the November 7, 2012 meeting. Motion approved.

### 2. Institutional values and responsibilities and student learning outcomes

The committee continued its discussion on values, responsibilities, and outcomes. Points of discussion included the following:

- Citizenship
  - Observation made that it is not a value but more of a responsibility
- Self-reflection and continual adaptation and improvement both can be fit into a value of development
- Respect
  - Concerns that “respect” does not capture that not all opinions are equal
  - What does valuing respect lead to regarding a responsibility to do as far as curriculum, co-curriculum, governance systems, etc.?
- Individuals
  - Consideration as to whether valuing people as individuals fits into the category of respect
  - What is it we really value – do we value individualism or just a certain type of individualism?
- Innovation
  - Concerns expressed that “innovation” as a value is a buzz word like sustainability
  - The current definition included is weak – is problem solving putting values into practice (so should it be a responsibility rather than a value)?
  - Innovation can be seen as connecting seemingly dissimilar ideas, seeing connections, having new ways of looking at the world. These ideas could be better captured as a skill for students derived from the value of learning
- Development
  - Always seeking to be better, seeking to improve and not resting on one’s laurels
  - The student moving from recipient of knowledge to the creator of knowledge – what is needed between these two?
  - Taking responsibility for one’s self – do we at times on campus create situations that allow behaviors that are undesirable (e.g., does open access to studios lead to students not cleaning up after themselves)?
  - Do we value having the initiative to take responsibility? For being accountable?

- How do we deal with students' unrealistic goals?
- Lifelong learning
  - Do we really challenge students to learn? To become competent in a variety of fields?
  - Do students engage to truly learn?
  - Do we really value lifelong learning?
  - The difference between knowing what you need to know to get something done (e.g., learning the latest MS Office version) vs. the desire to want to learn new things
  - Openness

At the end of the discussion, a concern was raised that we make sure that our list is what we actually value and do and not what we aspire to value and do.
